NCCC Going Green

NCCC has made upgrades to its recycling program with the hiring of METRO Waste Paper Recovery Inc. out of Depew. The upgraded recycling of the paper and cardboard will save NCCC approximately \$2,500 per year in direct costs and the College could realize an additional rebate of between \$2,400 and \$6,000 per year.

"In addition to the paper and cardboard recycling, all of our confidential document destruction will now be shredded on-campus, hauled away and we will receive certification that the documents have been destroyed," James Lobdell, assistant director of facilities said.

NCCC will also receive 40 95-gallon recycling bins that will be strategically located around campus to encourage students, staff, faculty and administrators to recycle.

Published Professors

 \Rightarrow **Dr. Kathy Gerbasi** and **Professor Laura Scaletta** co-authored "Furries A to Z (Anthropomorphism to Zoomophism)" an article that was published this past fall in the journal "Society & Animals". Students also contributed to the research article which scientifically analyzes the curious society of furries or humans that personify mascot-like animal characters. While Anthropomorphism has existed for ages furries are a fairly new trend. Dr. Gerbasi and her team of researchers were the first in the world to have published a peer-reviewed article on furries.

Sophie Hodorowicz Knab is the author of several books on Polish culture, traditions and folklore. On October 25, 2008 in Washington, D.C., Knab presented information on Polish folk traditions at "Poland: A Rich Tapestry" a series of events celebrating Polish culture. This unique series of cultural events, sponsored by the Smithsonian Institution and the Embassy of the Republic of Poland, takes place over two days at the Embassy of Poland. She has been a member of the faculty at NCCC since 1989 and currently serves as a professor in the nursing division and director of the licensed practical nursing program.


Nancy Knechtel has been named a researcher for a PBS documentary on Elbert Hubbard and the Roycroft movement. The documentary is being produced by WNED and will be broadcast on PBS in the spring of 2009. Knechtel is currently researching historic images of the Roycroft workshops in addition to other arts and crafts communities and artisans.

Dr. Yu Liu has recently had his book "Seeds of a Different Eden" published by The University of South Carolina Press. His book focuses on the study of the influence of Chinese gardening concepts on the English landscaping revolution of the early 18th century. A seasoned author, Liu has produced 14 works including the book "Poetics and Politics: The Revolutions of Wordsworth" which was published in 1999. He teaches developmental writing, freshman composition, introduction to literature, introduction to linguistics and British literature survey.

NCCC To Stand Out with Added Sports

The NCCC Board of Trustees approved a motion back in October, for a threeyear upgrade plan in the athletics department. The projected cost would be \$376,870 with the first year's cost of \$155,230 being the most significant amount.

The plan includes adding six sports over the next three years — men's and

NCCC Announce New Lacrosse Coaches

NCCC Athletic Director Lee Wallace '72 announced the addition of both men's and women's lacrosse teams with both seasons beginning in spring 2010. This is the first time NCCC has had lacrosse in its athletic program. Buffalo Bandits legend and professional lacrosse champion Rich Kilgour has been named head coach for the men's team and Brendan McDaniels, a respected area lacrosse coach and a fulltime employee in NCCC's public relations department, will coach the women's team. Baseball Wins Championship

The baseball team finished strong this fall, winning the Western New York Athletic Conference Tournament for the first time in NCCC history. The team finished 8-7, sweeping through the tournament, beating Erie Community College, 14-2, in the semifinals and Monroe Community College, 14-7, in the final. The stellar finish can partly be attributed to baseball coach Matt Clingersmith who was named the Co-Region III Coach of the Year, last spring. Clingersmith helped guide the Trailblazers to the Region III Final Four.

Wrestling Setting Records

Wrestling coach Eric Knuutila moved up the all-division, all-time win list this season, surpassing legendary coach Dan Gable of the University of Iowa.

Knuutila's 356th career win came in a 42-3 victory over Alfred State. The victory pushed him past Gable for 15th on the all-time list.

With his 361 wins heading into post-season, Knuutila also passed Bob Guzzo from North Carolina State, who led the Wolfpack for 30 years and posted a 356-183-7 record from 1975 to 2004. In the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), Knuutila ranks second in career wins.

Knuutila started the wrestling program at NCCC in 1973 and has since established an astonishing wrestling program, winning 13 regional titles and producing four national champions.

Sophomore Justin James (Spencerport, N.Y./Brockport) captured the Trailblazers' first-ever New York State Wrestling title in Januaray at the 165pound weight class. He captured the title by defeating Columbia's Aaron Civan, 3-1, in the championship match.

With James' title, NCCC finished ninth overall, its highest ranking since the program started in 1973-74.

Alumnus Discovers American Relic

Buried at Ferry Farm in Virginia is the boyhood home of America's founding father George Washington. While there are no standing remains, the archeological dig is the only record history has about Washington's formative years.

NCCC graduate Paul Nasca '89 is the field team leader of the excavation at Ferry Farm. He has been working for the past eight years as a staff archaeologist for the George Washington Foundation (GWF) uncovering truths and deciphering the relic.

Nasca attributes his love of anthropology and archeology to his historical hometown of Lewiston, N.Y. and his previous employment at Old Fort Niagara in Youngstown, N.Y. According to Nasca, it was a distant dream to have a career as an archeologist, and through the encouragement of professors at NCCC he realized he was able to accomplish his goals.

"NCCC is really where I started my career in anthropology," Nasca said. "Douglas "Doc" Knight was the director of archeology at Old Fort Niagara and through his encouragement and classes at NCCC, I realized I could make a living doing something that is personally satisfying."

After NCCC, Nasca received his bachelor's degree in anthropology and historic archeology from the University at Buffalo in 1992. Despite taking a hiatus, shortly thereafter, and working for a record label out of Manhattan, Nasca never lost touch with his roots at Old Fort Niagara. He went back to work for the historical site full-time before deciding to attend graduate school at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va. It was through many opportunities at William and Mary that Nasca was brought on for the Washington excavation project by Director of Archeology at Ferry Farm, Dave Muraca.

Ferry Farm is located near Fredericksburg, Va, 50 miles south of Washington, D.C., and just across the river in Stafford County. The Washington family moved there in 1738, when Washington was six-years-old.

Originally the 120 acres of land was to be bought by Wal-Mart. After many protests it was released and the dig began in 2001. Ferry Farm rightly ended up as the missing piece of a puzzle to the young years of the first President of the United States of America.

"This is truly a great project. Archeology is really shaping the future. The remains that we find will provide people with an understanding and help build a museum of what once stood as Washington's boyhood home," Nasca said.

GWF plans to recreate the structures that once stood on Ferry Farm during the 1740's which will be used for educational purposes. In addition to leading the talented team of archaeologists, Nasca has undertaken the responsibility of being at the forefront for the museum's efforts on habitat restoration and the conservation of fragile artifacts.

"It is safe to say that Paul's skills and abilities, enormous dedication, and just plain hard work have resulted in not only an incredibly successful excavation, but his museum-building efforts have enriched the lives of thousands of visitors who have come to see the dig, look at birds and nature, and learn about the past from our exhibits," Muraca said.

The dig and research is partly funded by the National Geographic Society. Nasca and his team received national press when the National Geographic Channel premiered a program titled "The Real George Washington" on November 19, 2008. The episode was part of National Geographic's "Expedition Week." Nasca and his team also appeared in an article recently published by the *Smithsonian Magazine* in September 2008.

"NCCC can take pride in knowing that it helped shape the man that Paul has become. He is a credit to the institution," said Muraca.

Washington's Ferry Farm is an active archaeological site. Guided tours, group visits and private walkingtours are available to the public based on seasonal hours. There is a small admission fee for visitors.

Alumni Association Restructured

The NCCC Alumni Association underwent structural changes and became a committee of the NCCC Foundation at the November 12, 2008, meeting.

This new alliance combines the Foundation and Alumni Association efforts to


Holiday Helpers

The outdated studio has caught up with technology and the times. Most of the previous equipment dated back to the 1970's. Thanks to the grant provided by the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Act, NCCC was able to make the necessary upgrades in the production studio.

The original space was built along with the college in 1973. The renovations have converted a once retro and out-of-date studio into a fresh high-definition production facility including a computerized lighting system, green screen technology, multiple video formatting production, professional audio recording booth, a teleprompter, and a new digital surround sound video screening room equipped with a high-definition flat screen monitor.

"Society has changed how it sends and receives information, and with this new facility, NCCC students will be leaders in the ever changing world," Dr. James P. Klyczek, NCCC President said. "This state-of-the-art facility will be a tremendous asset in further strengthening the digital media program."

In Memoriam: Al Saladino

Niagara County Community College mourns the loss of Human Services Professor Al Saladino. The celebrated social worker, professor and counselor died unexpectedly October 29, 2008.

Saladino touched the lives of many students throughout his career at NCCC which began more than two decades ago. Saladino earned his bachelor's degree from Buffalo State College and a master's in social work from the University at Buffalo. He started working at NCCC in 1989 and was promoted to assistant professor in 1992. Saladino was awarded tenure in 1994 and shortly after was promoted to associate professor in 1997. In September 2002, Saladino advanced to become a full professor at the College.

In addition to his work as a professor and mentor Saladino was also the disability studies coordinator and the chemical dependency counseling coordinator. He served as the past-president of the NCCC faculty senate and the New York State Human Services Educator's Association. He also was the recipient of the SUNY President's Award for Excellence in Academic Advisement in 1992.

The NCCC Faculty Association has extended a full tuition scholarship at NCCC to his children Michael Saladino, Sam Saladino and Nina Saladino.

In Memoriam: Robert Lord

Those who have worked with Robert Lord have nothing but kind and endearing words to say. His unfortunate passing in August 2008, left behind great memories and love for a wonderful instructor, husband, father and friend.

Born in Liverpool, England, Lord grew up and later went on to earn his bachelor of arts' degree from Manchester University and earned his postgraduate certificate in education from the University of Waterloo.

In June 2008, Lord was named coordinator of the National GeoTech Center: Northeast at NCCC. The National Science Foundation granted \$1.8 million in funds to the multi-college collaborative project, which designates NCCC as a Center for Advanced Technological Education in Geospatial Technology. The goal is to increase the number of geospatial technicians needed in the field.

Lord joined the faculty in 2003, spending six short years at the College. Before becoming an instructor he also worked for the Peel Board of Education for 25 years in Canada, and also at Buffalo State College.

Contributions were made in his memory that will purchase books for the Henrietta G. Lewis Library specifically in his area of expertise. His wife, Lynda Lord, donated a vast collection of his books and maps to the library in his memory.
